Explanations and answers to select questions

- 02 Option (B) is the correct answer. The correct spelling is : Lambaste.
- 07 Option (B) is the correct answer. It is a noun as well as a verb, both meaning differently.
- 11 Option (A) is the correct answer. It is 'Burble' : 'Bubble+Murmur'.
- 14 Option (C) is the correct answer. The syllables are : hy-per-bo-le.
- 15 Option (D) is the correct answer. The four additional/other words are : retrains, strainer, terrains, trainers.
- 23 Option (D) is the correct answer. When 'neither' . . . 'nor' is used, the subject closer to the verb (*sisters*) determines the number of the verb. Hence, 'are'.
- 25 Option (D) is the correct answer. 'should' is used to show what is, 'right, appropriate, etc.' for which 'because . . .' provides the reason.
- 27 Option (A) is the correct answer. The word 'tempest' is not a superlative degree. It is a noun meaning 'a violent storm'. Pronunciation of the first syllable of 'tempest', is as in 'temple', a consonant sound, so 'a'. 'Bay of Bengal' being a specific bay and the only of its kind, 'the'.
- 29 Option (D) is the correct answer. The first pair is of opposites and to make the second pair similar in manner, only 'provoke' provides that (*opposite*).
- 31 Option (D) is the correct answer. As the reporting verb is in the future tense (*will say*), there is no change of tense in the reported speech without the quotes.
- 33 Option (D) is the correct answer. It is not possible to have a passive form in the present perfect continuous tense.
- 35 Option (D) is the correct answer. It is the only one that can be a past tense.
- 44 Option (B) is the correct answer. The two homonyms are : flight and plane.
