**Explanations and answers to select questions**

01 The words are : (i) Spider [S], (ii) Sheep [R], (iii) Painter [P], (iv) Jeeps [Q]. So, option (C) is the correct answer.

02 The words are : (i) Pumpkin [S], (ii) Penguin [R], (iii) Pigeon [Q], (iv) Panda [P]. So, option (D) is the correct answer.

03 Option (C) is the correct answer. No other option is/can be used as a verb, neither any of it is defined as a verb. Please refer to the Oxford Advanced Learner's Dictionary, 10th edition published in 2020, if need be. A note stating the same is already printed in our communication as regards the exam.

04 Option (D) is the correct answer. It has the same spelling for its plural.

05 Option (C) is the correct answer. It's the same spelling for its past tense.

07 Option (A) is the correct answer. The correct spelling is 'Broccoli'.

09 Option (C) is the correct answer. A 'catch' of fish. Option (A) is not. Please refer to the Oxford Advanced Learner's Dictionary, 10th edition published in 2020. A note stating the same is already printed in our communication as regards the exam.

19 Option (C) is the correct answer. Both 'way' and 'stadium' are specific; not any way but the one that leads to that place, and not any stadium, but the indoor one, and so at both places 'the'.

20 Option (D) is the correct answer. In the first pair, both pineapple and apple grow above the ground and are fruits; so in the second, capsicum and tomato both grow above the ground and are vegetables.

21 Option (C) is the correct answer. It is the only name that is of common gender, all others are of feminine gender.

23 Option (B) is the only correct answer. Option (D) 'rotten' is 'spoiled' and not 'stale', which means 'not fresh'.

25 Option (B) is the only correct answer. There is no word pair established and accepted the world over, as 'milk and sugar'.

34 Option (C) is the only correct answer. The other option could be 'aha' (which is an exclamation) and not 'ahh' (which you quote and is incorrectly spelt).
